



Nicholas L. Paul was born in New York City, NY, in 1977. He received a BA from Davidson College in North Carolina and an M.Phil and PhD in History at the University of Cambridge in 2005. Paul joined the faculty at Fordham University, one of the world's leading centers for the study of the Middle Ages, in 2006. At Fordham his primary areas of research and teaching are the crusades, the medieval Middle East, and political culture in the central Middle Ages, with special reference to the Angevin Empire of King Henry II, Eleanor of Aquitaine, and their heirs (1154-1242). He teaches both undergraduate and graduate students and is the director of several doctoral students.

His first book, *To Follow in Their Footsteps: The Crusades and Family Memory in the High Middle Ages* (2012) was co-winner of the John Nicholas Brown Prize of the Medieval Academy of America. At Fordham, he served for six years as Director of the Center for Medieval Studies, where he has been involved in several Digital Humanities initiatives, including the *Oxford Outremer Map project*, the *Siege of Antioch Project*, and *The Independent Crusaders Project*. Paul has also co-edited two volumes of essays arising from conferences at the Center, *Remembering the Crusades: Myth, Image, and Identity* (ed. with Suzanne Yeager, 2012) and *The French of Outremer: Communities and Communications in the Crusading Mediterranean* (ed. with Laura K. Morreale, 2018). He was also co-editor of a collection of essays on popular understandings of the Middle Ages written for the general public entitled *Whose Middle Ages? Teachable Moments for an Ill-Used Past* (2019).

He has held visiting fellowships at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton, New Jersey, Clare Hall, Cambridge, and the University of Birmingham, where he was a US-UK Fulbright Fellow. He has written for or been interviewed by BBC History Today, New York magazine, the New York Times, and CNN.

Nicholas was nominated to the Order of St John in 2013 and promoted to Officer in 2017. He currently lives in Long Island City, NY with his wife Dr. Caroline Paul and their daughter Anthea.
